
ITS NAME: THE "BEREAN"

The Bereans were those noble ones of whom it is written in Acts 17:11, "they received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the Scriptures daily . . .". As a reminder to ourselves to "search the Scriptures daily" we have named our book for these noble children of God. "THE BEREAN".

ITS CREST:

The Crest that forms the cover design of this book is in four parts. There is the first, the background-the shield. Eph. 6:16 tells us, "above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked". So the "shield of faith" forms the foundation for our crest. The second part is in the heart of the shield, the Word of God - His true, infallible word, It draws the sinner to the Saviour: it holds the child near to the heart of God! The Word of God is our Bible School Text Book. In Matt. 14:35, the Lord Jesus speaks, "Heaven and earth shall pass away, but my words shall not pass away", so we come to the third part of our crest, below the open Book, "Littera Scripta Manet" - The Written Word Remaineth. The fourth part "C.P.B.I." identifies our Bible School with our testimony to Jesus Christ: "contending for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints", declaring His unerring Word which "shall not pass away".





CHILD FOR CHRIST CRUSADE

Every year a most encouraging and result-Every year a most encouraging and result-bringing field is opened to our students through the Child for Christ organization. This year ten or more students are leaders of, or assisting in, these children's classes which meet in schools or in private homes.

Through the kindness of the Superintend-Through the kindness of the Superintendent of Schools and the co-operation of Principals, some schools have been opened to meetings. Killarney boasts the largest group, having three classes of well over one hundred children. Five of our students minister to them faithfuly week by week. Over one hundred have been saved in this school.

The new worker gets a real thrill the first time he stands before a large class of expectant little faces. Anything can happen too. A worker tells of a time, when, as he was to reach the appeal in the lesson, a boy (as only boys can do) let all his marbles run from his pocket and scatter everywhere. Helpful hands quickly came to the rescue, With s masterful attempt the teacher regained the point of the lesson. The greatest thrill comes when the worker is able by the Word to lead some children to Christ. This work has been the start for many students in child evangelism and in soul winning.



INTER-SCHOOL CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP

Another very encouraging field open to our students is the Inter-school Christian Fellowship. The need in the student world is great. Once again through the kindness of the Superintendent of Schools and the co-operation of the Principals several schools have been opened to these meetings. Some of our students are sponsors of groups and gather with these Intermediate School students for Bible study and discussion. The opportunity thus presented is a real privilege and a tremendous responsibility.

The primary concern of the fellowship staff and sponsors is to evangelize the schools and to become real effective personal workers.

We praise God for this opportunity for practical service among the young people.



STREET MEETINGS

Street meetings are commended by the Lord Street meetings are commended by the Lord in Luke 14:21, 23. Many of the great preachers of the past have made use of them; John the Baptist held meetings in the open air; so did Peter and Paul. If a greater example is needed, the greatest of all preachers, the Lord Jesus, spoke to the multitudes on many occasions at open air meetings. The great sermons of the Bible, The Sermon on the Mount, the Pentecostal Revival, the address from Mars Hill, were all given in the open air. Hence it is counted a privilege to give out the Word of God in this fashion.

With the students of the Institute, every Saturday evening at 6.30, music begins and a street-meeting is under way. The girls gather at one side and the boys at the other, with the band in the centre. The brisk song to join in the singing of some of the favorite old hymns. Then follows a testimony time in which a personal word from many of the students tells the passing crowd that the things of the world do not satisfy. Interspersed in the program are such choruses as: "He Lives", "I took a Plunge in the Crimson Flood," "Jesus Took My Burdens All Away".

The service closes with a hymn of invitation and an appeal is given to the bystanders to accept the Saviour. Thanks be to God for the "sheaves" that have been gathered in this way.



The work here was begun in the early years of the Institute by the late William Aberhart, together with other faithful workers who assisted him at that time.

The place of meeting has varied over the years because the congregation has not been of sufficient strength to secure a building for itself. At the present time, through the kind courtesy of Lutheran friends, the free use of their church building is permitted for services. The congregation here is small, none-the-less many blessings in worshipping together have been enjoyed

LONGVIEW FUNDAMENTAL GOSPEL MISSION Pastor: Roland Hawkes

In the southern part of Alberta's famous "Turner Valley", in 1938, there grew up, seemingly during the night, a "Little New York", - another name for Longview.

In the matter of days there grew up twenty-one restaurants and a large hotel; places of business were open day and night.

There was no church in the near vicinity, but God called a young farmer to Bible School and then to Little New York; thus Bro. Thomas Jones and his wife set their faces toward the Master's business. The Lord called a goodly number of faithful followers through their ministry, and services were started in the building now known as 'Longview Fundamental Gospel Mission'.

When Bro. Jones was called to Vancouver, Bro. George Robinson and his family continued the work in the mission until they were called to a church at Wetaskiwin. Soon after this, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Addison answered the call for the summer of 1946, Since April of 1947, Mr. and Mrs Rowland Hawkes have enjoyed the blessing of the Lord in their ministry with the friends of Longview.

ASSOCIATE CHURCHES

ARROWWOOD GOSPEL MISSION Pastor Tom Addison



This mission began a comparatively short time ago, and yet its development has been most remarkable. In February, 1947, a number of Christians of the district of Arrowwood wrote to the Extension Dept. of the Calgary Prophetic Bible Institute, requesting that evangelistic meetings be held in the U.F.A. Hall in Arrowwood. These meetings proved a great success, and through them about thirty souls professed an acceptance of Christ as their personal Saviour These Gospel meetings were enjoyed so much that the group requested that they be continued each Surday evening by visiting speakers and Gospel Teams coming from the Bible Institute in Calgary.

In April by a vote of this group, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Addison were invited to reside at Arrowwood, Mr. Addison to become their pastor. This call was gladly accepted and they took up residence on May 13 to begin their ministry.

Before their pastor's arrival, however, these of the group had organized a regular prayer meeting, held each Friday night. This has contined to be Prayer Meeting Night. In addition to this, a Young People's Group has been organized which meets on Wednesday evenings. This mission began a comparatively short time ago,

evenings.

Studies on the subject of Water Baptism have been held, and a number of the Christians wish to obey the Word and follow their Lord through the waters of baptism, for which certainly the Lord

is to be praised.

Early in November, the work here was organized under the name "The Arrowwood Gospel Mission" and is now responsible for its own support and progress.



As a result of a number of conversions at a series of Gospel Meetings conducted by Mr. Whitmer of Fort Payne, Indiana, during the fall of 1930, the Langdon Baptist Church was established. The following winter the late Mr. William Aberhart was called upon by the group of Christians living around Langdon to organize a Branch Church in connection with the Bible Institute of Calgary.

The first meetings of this Branch Church were held in a former pool hall in Langdon. Four students from the Institute: George McElroy, Richard Main, Ernest Manning, Palmer Peterson, conducted the first of these meetings and several others that followed. Then, for some years, Mr. J.A. Reid supplied the pulpit. aided by Gospel teams from the Institute during the winter months.

Langdon Baptist Church held services in the W.I. Rooms from 1935 till 1938 and in this atter year, purchased the building formerly owned by the Royal Bank of Canada. This building still provides adequately for the meetings of the Church.

Among a goodly number who have been saved and have been encouraged in the Christian life through the years, the following come to mind: Beverly Macomber, a missionary-teacher now in Ethiopia; Albert Brant, a missionary in Ethiopia; Doris Dye, a candidate to the mission field in Nigeria; Alta Nichols, Alice Dye and Ruth Dye, home missionaries; Ione Anderson, teacher at Canadian Bible Institute, Regina; and Mavis Anderson, Western Representative of the Christian and Missionary Alliance in Young People's and Sunday School work.
