

Socreds celebrate Aberhart victory

I t was a day to remember the successes of the past, the struggles of the present and, for roughly 100 members of the Alberta Social Credit party, plan for the future.

It was 70 years ago today that the party and its leader, William Aberhart, won a historic election that would see the party stay in power for 36 years.

On Sunday, members of the party reminisced about the old days. They met on the same spot — St. George's Island on the Bow River — where Aberhart and his supporters gathered to celebrate the one-year anniversary of their famous victory in the midst of the Depression.

"Alberta learned in the bad times (that) you couldn't count on the federal government to take care of you and so you better to care of yourself in the good times," said guest speaker Preston Manning.

"I think there's lessons from those hard time that are applicable to these prosperous times," said Manning, founder of the Reform party and son of longtime Socred Premier Ernest Manning. "Alberta's patterns are unique — long periods of one-party government, political upheaval."

Ray Speaker, a former cabinet minister in Ernest Manning's government, said the group will have to wait for the right moment to break back into the provincial scene.

"I've gone through this type of metamorphosis that the current Social Credit party is trying to bring into being, you know, as a strong political agent in Alberta," said Speaker, who formed the Representative party in the 1980s, then joined the Alberta Tories, and later Reform.

"It's a tough job and a big challenge.

"To bring about political change by any kind of a political movement is very, very, difficult."

Speaker said the next federal election could form the basis for Alberta's political direction.
