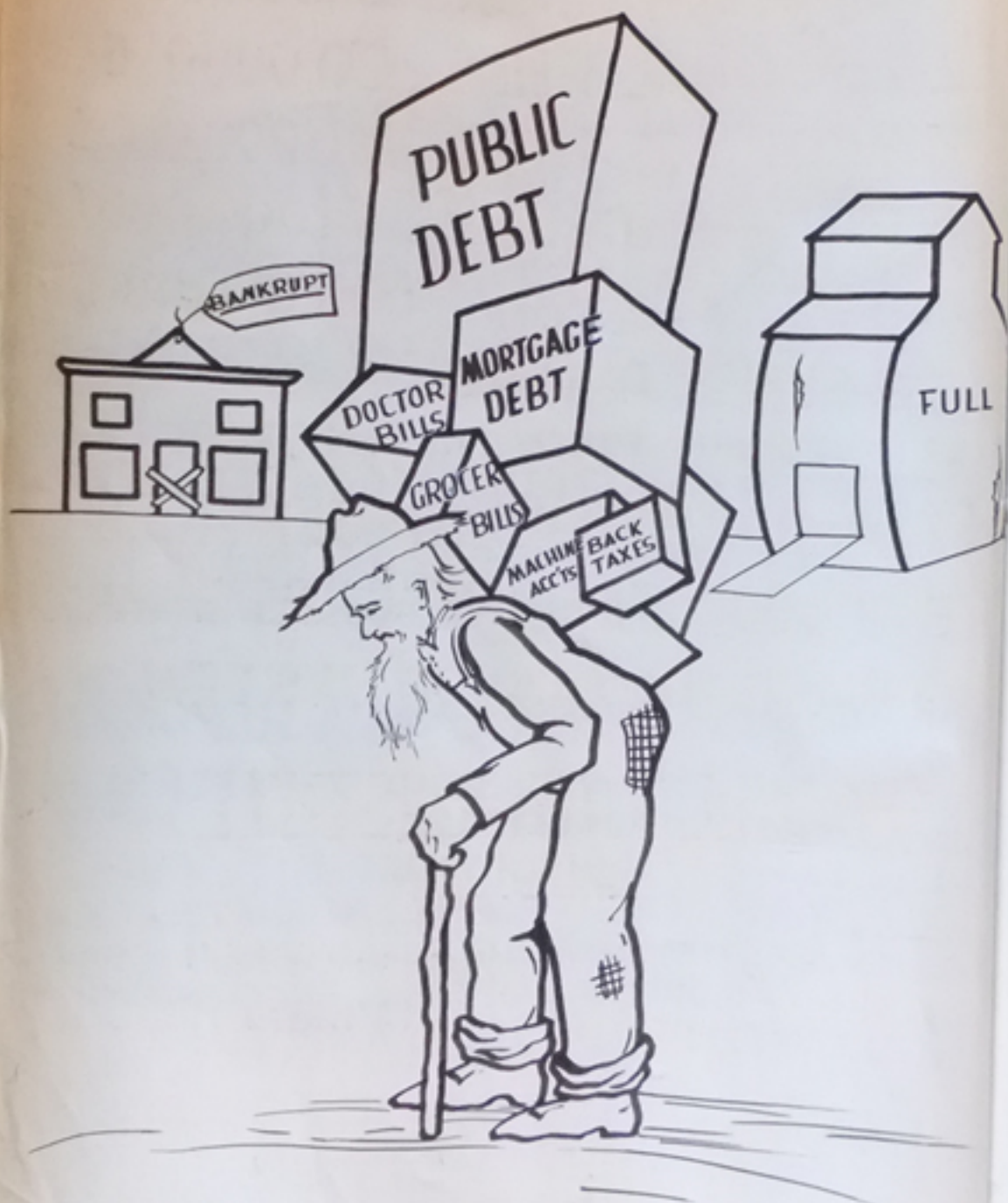

PUBLIC DEBT - 1921 - \$95,000,000.

SAYS BANK OF CANADA REPORT 1937:

"THE ROOTS OF MANY OF ALBERTA'S PRESENT PROBLEMS WERE DEVELOPED DURING THIS PERIOD..THE 1905-22 PERIOD WAS CHARACTERIZED BY WASTE, LOOSE ADMINISTRATION AND INCURRENCE OF DEBT...WHICH COULD NOT BE JUSTIFIED EVEN WHEN ALLOWANCE IS MADE FOR THE OPTIMISTIC SPIRIT OF THE TIMES.... THE POLICIES PURSUED---RESULTED IN THE ACCUMULATION OF A HEAVY DEAD WEIGHT DEBT... NO EFFORT WAS MADE TO PUT THE GOVERNMENT --ON A SELF-SUPPORTING BASIS, IN SPITE OF THE FAVORABLE OPPORTUNITY PRESENTED BY THE GENERAL PROSPERITY "

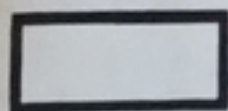

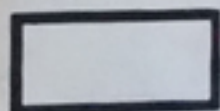

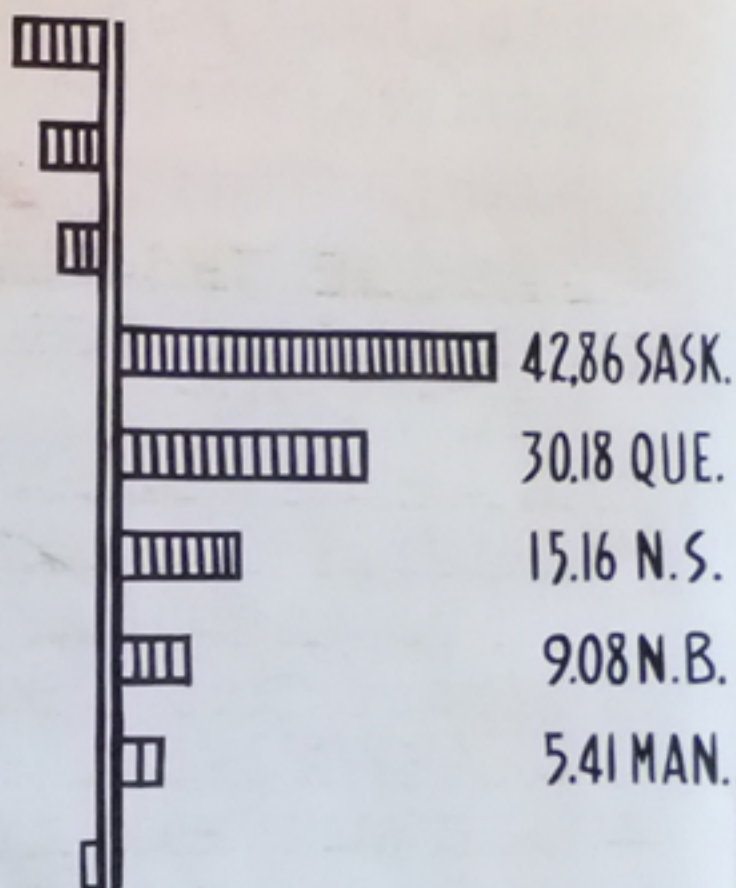
