How-\*son, provincial Liberal leader, was elected in Edmonton when counting of first choices was virtually completed by Journal tabulators at 10:00 p.m. It appeared that the quota necessary to elect in the city would be about 5,100 and Mr. Howson had received 8,62% first choices when 169 polls out of a total of 171 had been heard from

The second choices of all Mr. Howson's ballots will now be distributed.

W. R. Howson, Liberal leader, swung into a commanding lead among Edmonton candidates as first returns started to pour in. Social Credit candidates, following the example of their fellows in the country, were well to the front, holding three of the first six places in a summary of 10 scattered split polls, out of a total of 171.

This summary gave Mr. How-son 422 first choices. He was followed by S. A. G. Barnes, Social Credit, with 206; Dr. W. S. Hall, Social Credit, 104; O. A. Kennedy, Social Credit, 84; Mrs. Marion Conroy, Liberal, 73; D. M. Duggan, Conservative leader, 69, and Attorney General J. F. Lymburn, 61.

### Barnes Second

Running second to Mr. Howson was S. A. G. Barnes, Social Credit, with 4,300 first choices, at least 800 short of the quota

Following Mr. Barnes were Dr. W Hall, Social Credit, with 2,758; D. B. Mullen, Social Credit, with 2,373; Hon. J. F. Lymburn, U.F.A., with 1,971; O. A. Kennedy, Social Credit, with 1,778, and D. M. Duggan, Conservative leader, with 1,382.


