## This Is A strange Romance

Was it love or just a passing fancy that the Canadian voter felt for John Diefenbaker back in March, 1958?

Too early to say, probably; yet this is certainly a strange romance.

Never in the 19-year history of the Canadian Gallup poll has a party in power dropped so far so fast in popular favor-just as no party ever rose so quickly as did the Conservatives after they chose Mr. Diefenbaker to lead them. The statistical record reads like a fever chart.

Are these merely the ups and downs that afflict even secure marriages. Or does the present trend mark the beginning of a permanent estrangement,

The answer lies mainly in the hands of Mr. Diefenbaker. Nearly three years are left before he must call another election. If in that time he can come to grips with the country's problems—instead of fiddling with them or dodging them—he may win another term of office.

At present, disenchantment is spreading because of chronic unemployment. Not only the jobless, but many businessmen and industrialists are also disillusioned. They feel uncertain and unconfident about the government's economic policies.

The trend of political sentiment is nationwide, the poll finds. The Liberals, reduced to a small minority in Parliament only two years ago, are now running almost neck-and-neck with the Conservatives in popular favor. The CCF and Social Credit are also on the upswing, if only slightly.

Unless the Diefenbaker government starts living up to the radiant image of its courting days, it may suffer early divorce, on grounds of economic incompetence.
