Students Told To Expect Biggest Challenge

Dr. Malcolm Taylor, principal of the University of Alber-Calgary, Thursday told graduates of William Aberhart High School that they were entering a world highlighted by a "revolution in mass expectations."

"This age which you are part of will be remembered as the first age in which people dared to think it practicable to make the benefits of civilization available to the whole human race." he said.

In his address to the gr uates at the school's seed graduation ceremony, Dr. Tylor pointed out that as adits they were now faced with the challenge of the world they were entering.

Christianity and Communism - the two "ideologies" in today's world - are confronting today's graduates, he added.

"You must show the world, by your example, that Christianity and its free way of life is the only kind of society which affords unlimited opportunity to young people," he said.
