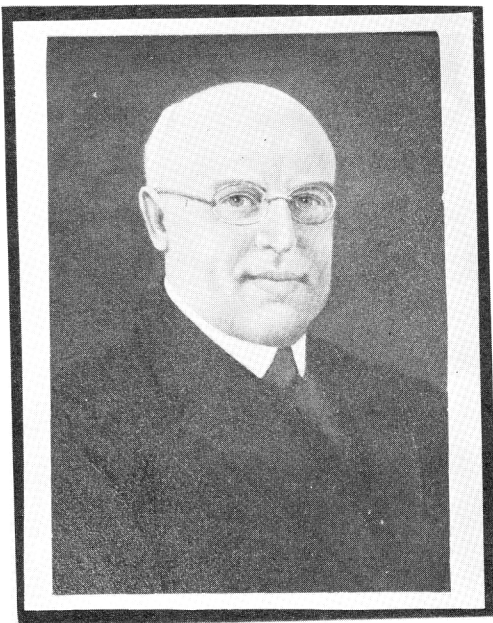
PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

STUDENTS' COUNCIL MESSAGE

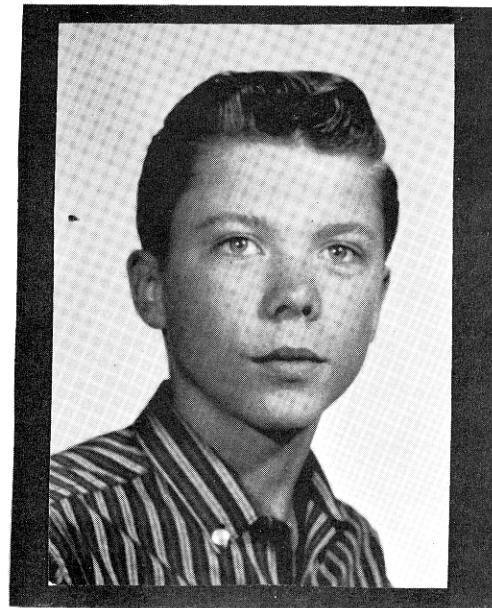
This message is addressed to the students who will comprise the first class to graduate from William Aberhart in 1961.

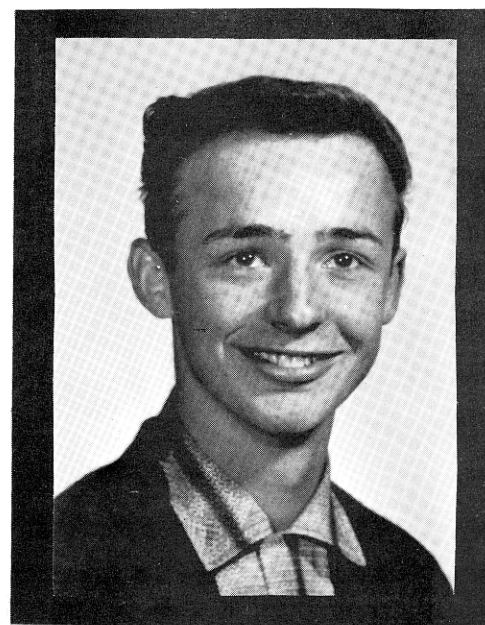
EDITOR'S MESSAGE

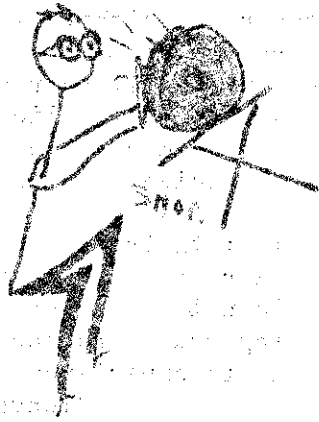
Fisherman's Luck

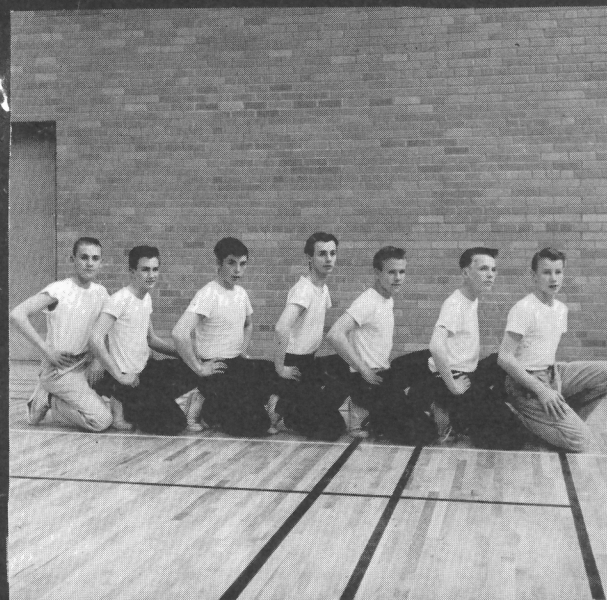

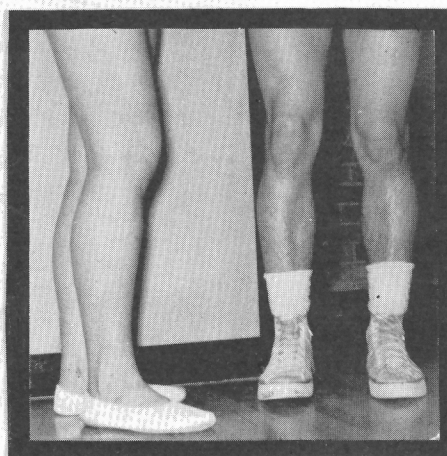

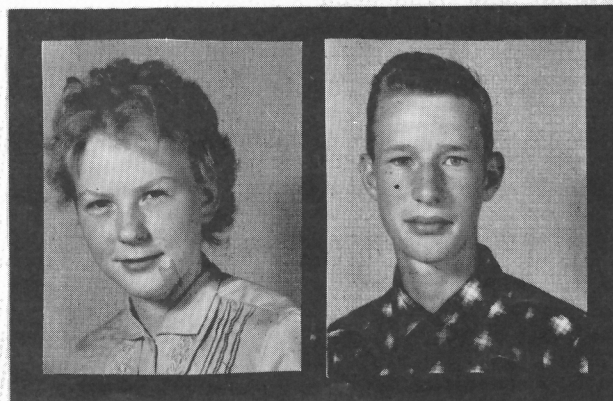

The Open Dance

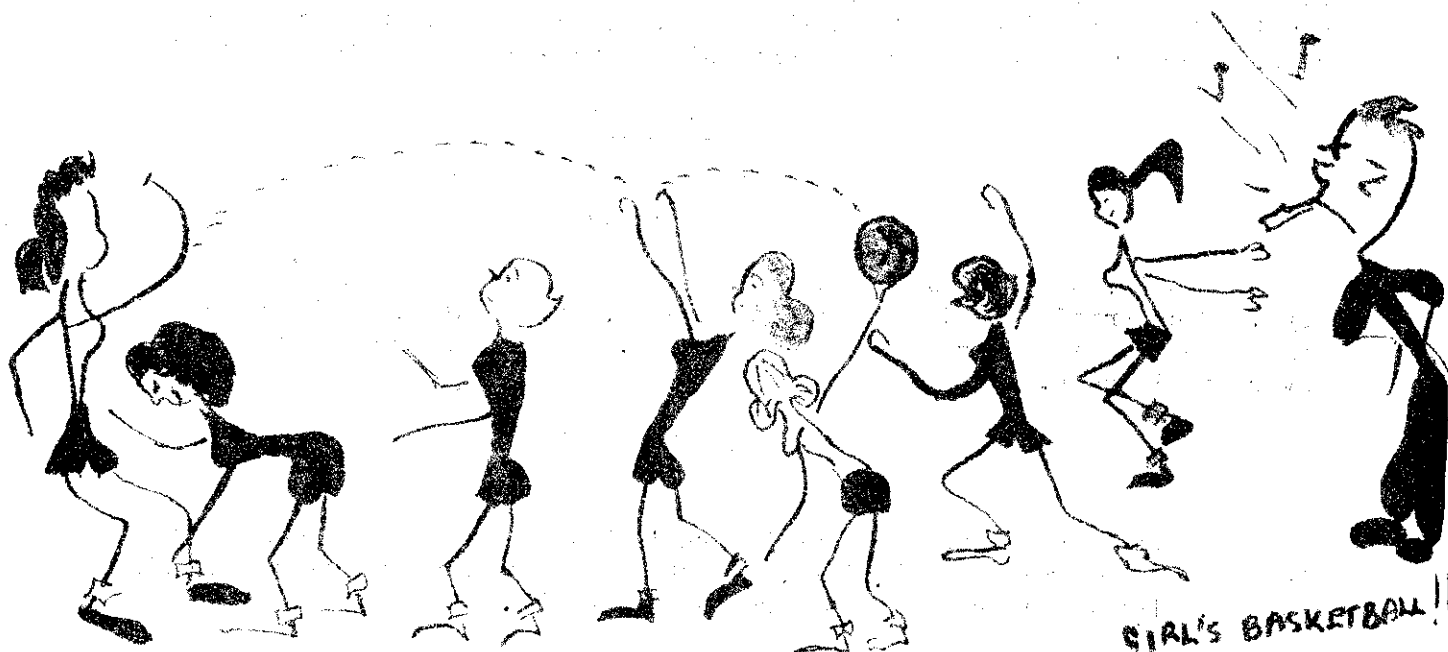

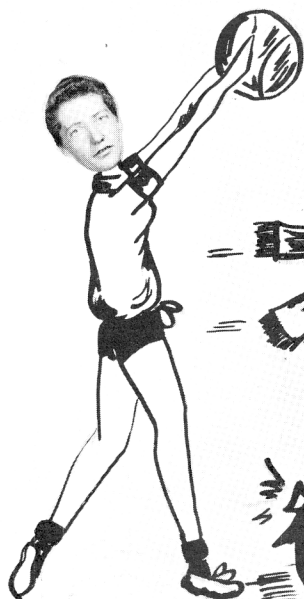
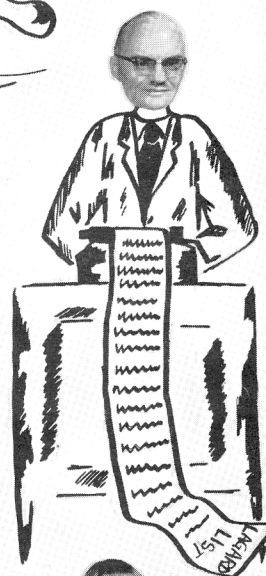
The Ping Pong Tournament was the club's main activity this year. A trophy was provided for the winner.

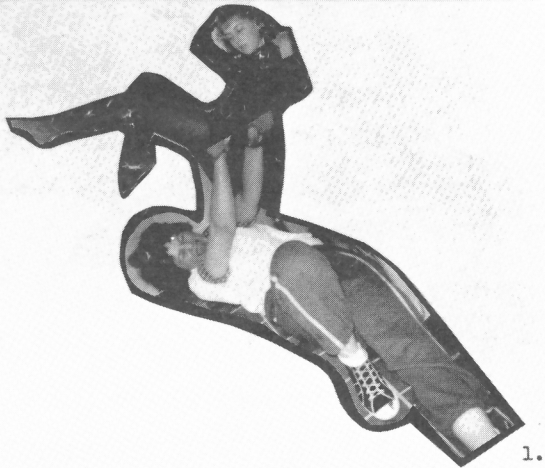
