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#### Hutchinson Tells Bible Institute People Are Enlightened

"Men and women of Alberta will never be able to say, 'I never knew' and 'I have no hope of enlightening any man or women listening to my voice, on the Word of God, for we are not living in ignorance and darkness," Cyril Hutchinson told the congregation of the Calgary Prophetic Bible Institute Sunday afternoon.

"I have no excuse to make for the Word of God, it doesn't need it, but some day we will be before God without excuse and I have no message therefore, except that contained in the Word of God," the speaker conem-

He urged his hearers to face three questions, laying aside personal opinion, and answer them fairly. "Why must I be saved? How Must I be saved? and When Must I be saved?"

"You and I are sons and daughters of the Father, not a monkey or a gorilla as some would have us believe. We have the nature of Adam and salvation is our heritage,' Mr. Hutchinson said. "People of today are trying to work their way into Heaven, but their sins are still there," the speaker said, "even though they go to Church on Sundays, sing hymns and put on bland expressions."

The afternoon broadcast was sponsored by the West Mount Pleasant Social Credit Group, of which Mrs. Arthur Ash is president.



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# Joseph Klutchinson.-In Memoriam.

T is with the deepest regret that we have to report the death of Joseph Hutchinson. He has been one of our most devoted workers, and was well known not only at our P-S-A but by almost every person in our Great sympathy was [manifested at his funeral on Thursday, October 25th. Prior to the interment an impressive service was held, which was conducted by our President (Mr. Park) and the Rev. Bramwell Dutton. Suitable hymns were sung, and the lesson was read by the Rev. S. Vernon, of Gorton. Mr. J. B. Thompson played "O rest in the Lord." At the graveside the service was also conducted by the Rev. Bramwell Dutton and Mr. Park, and the hymn "Lead, kindly Light," was sung. In addition to the family there were many friends and a large number of the committee of the P-S-A Society present. The bearers were Messrs. H. Crane, James Leigh, S. Barker, and T. Bootles. On Sunday afternoon, October 28th, a special memorial

service was held, and a beautiful address was given by our President, who said: The providence of God never presses more sorely upon the heart, or raises harder questions in the mind, than when His servant Death knocks at the door of some unconscious home, and summonses a member of the household across the worn and familiar threshold. Let us have no quarrel with the office of the dark angel-let us not dare to allow such entrances into our homes to make them appear utter unreason and cruelty, and as a mere caprice and blunder of the Divine Providence. Any act which suggests carelessness or cruelty on the part of God is an unspeakable and irredeemable calamity. Yes, my dear friends, let us, under these sad calamities in

life, leave God untouched in His wisdom and love, and the pious soul can bear many afflictions, for at the worst it can hide itself in Him, who is the soul's refuge and help in its time of deepest trouble. The vindication of God is the first thought of faith in the face of trial and bereavement, and we are never inclined to judge our Heavenly Father with greater harshness than when we are standing amid the ruins of a home—a broken home! Such a reflection is surely natural to me when I recall the fact that on Thursday afternoon last there was brought into this chapel—the religious home of the Ashton P-S-A Society—with loving hands, and embosomed with emblems of fond regard, all that was mortal of Joseph Hutchinson. On that occasion, too, an opportunity was afforded to me, as the leader of the Society, and on behalf of the Brotherhood, to pay our last respects to our departed brother, and to accompany his remains with sorrowful hearts to its last resting place in God's acre up yonder, where so many lie interred. Naturally enough this great organisation-whose activities centre around these buildings-expect that I should give voice to much that every member of the Society feels this afternoon under the heavy loss we all experienced on

Monday last in the death of one who worshipped with us here last Sunday, and whose name is a household word in almost every alley and street in this town and neighbourhood, and whose zeal and earnestness to promote the welfare of the Society knew no bounds. Almost from the very inception of the P-S-A in this town our departed friend recognised its inherent value as a means of moral and spiritual reformation. He also recognised, with those of us who were the pioneers of the P-S-A movement in this part of the country, that it was the peremptory duty of all who name the name of Christ to seek and to save the lost, and that any agency which can be successfully employed in this sacred ministry ought to commend itself to those who truly seek the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom. Joseph Hutchinson was not one of those who would permit blind prejudice to thwart or stifle any activity which has for its ultimate aim the accomplishment of the Divine ideal. Speaking as the President and

Leader of this powerful Society—a position I have had the honour and heavy responsibility of occupying for quite fifteen years —I can honestly say that no man associated with me in the work had a higher conception of its possibilities for good, and of its effective power in solving the problem of "How to reach the masses" than Joseph Hutchinson had. Not only so, but the hopeful. vigorous, fertile, and resourceful mind which he possessed clearly saw that by its vigorous activities the very men who have been the despair of all the churches can be reached and blessed and saved. But there is one special department of work identified with this Society that Joseph Hutchinson originated, promoted, and developed, until it to-day,

as a machinery for real moral and religious uplifting, stands unrivalled by anything of the kind in this country. I refer to our Sunday Evening Gospel Lantern Lectures. it was here where his great services were not only gratefully recognised, but signally successful and blessed. The marvellous faculty he exhibited in the harmony and unity and completeness of arrangement was a joy to the Brotherhood, and a rich legacy, though accompanied by a heavy responsibility, has now become the property of our Brotherhood. Joseph Hutchinson well knew, as a religious man, that it was not merely the function of these Sunday Evening Lantern Services to amuse and interest, but to uplift the fallen, and inspire within them and the careless and indifferent the highest ideals of life and of duty. How many thousands throughout this town and district have been inspired to a nobler life by these services eternity alone will reveal. Now our brother is gone, and gone to that bourne from which no traveller returns, and our hearts go out in deep sympathy to the sorely stricken widow and sorely bereaved family. Our earnest prayer for them is that the Almighty may grant them that spiritual comfort and consolation which the world neither can give nor take away.
